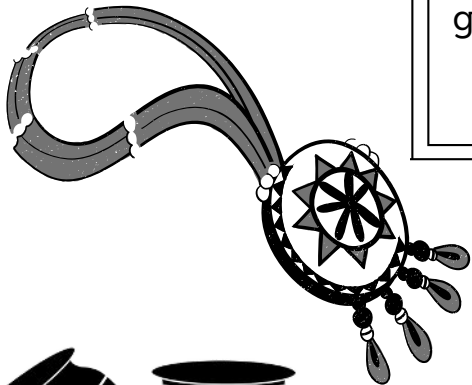
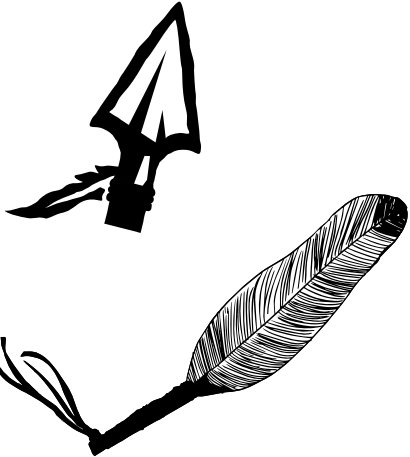
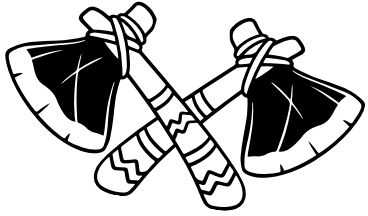


WHAT IS INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY?

Indigenous Peoples' Day is celebrated in the United States on the second Monday in October. It honors the history, culture, and contributions of Native people.

Indigenous people were the first people who lived here long before settlers. They care for nature, their families, and passed down stories for many generations. This day is a way to show them respect and gratitude.

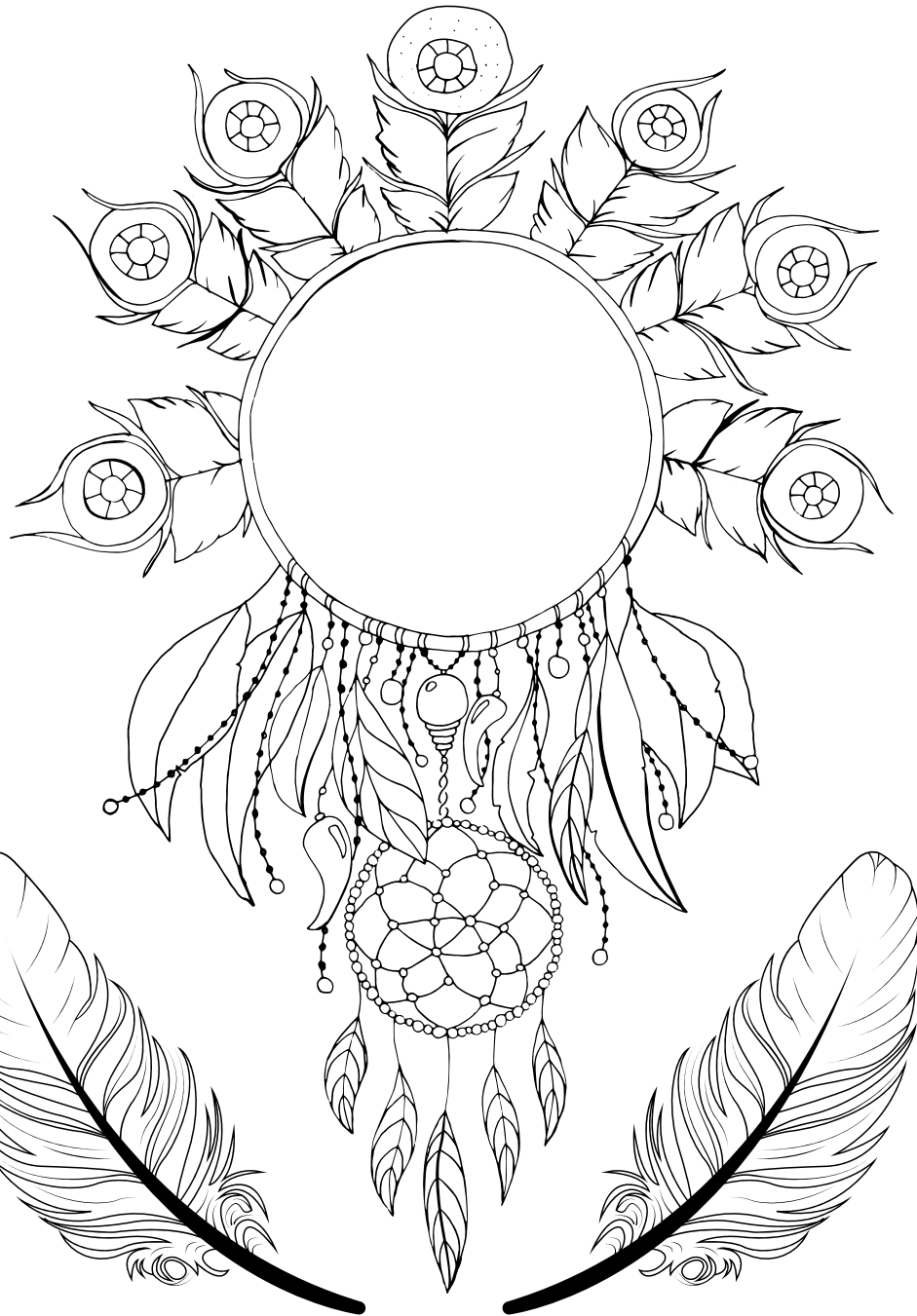

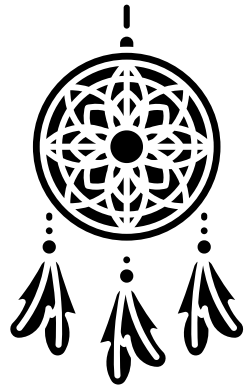
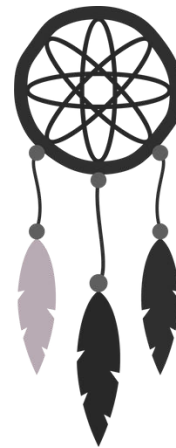


EVERY FEATHER TELLS A STORY



DREAMCATCHER

Dreamcatchers are traditional items made by Indigenous people. They are believed to protect children by catching bad dreams and letting only the good ones pass through. Today, dreamcatchers are also symbols of culture and heritage.

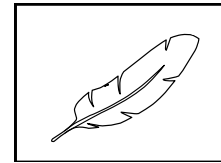


INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' SYMBOLS

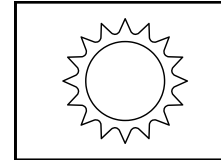
Indigenous People use many symbols to share their stories and beliefs. A feather is a sign of honor and is given to those who show bravery or kindness. The sun is respected because it gives light, warmth, and life to all living things. The turtle is very special in many stories because it represents the earth, sometimes called turtle Island. Corn is a sacred gift from the creator and symbolizes life, survival, and identity. The eagle is admired for its strength and courage, and it is seen as a messenger to the Creator.

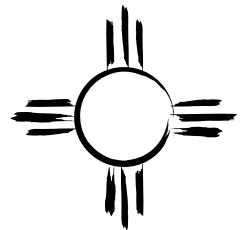
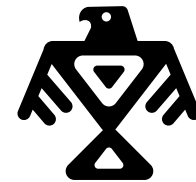
CULTURE AND TRADITIONS

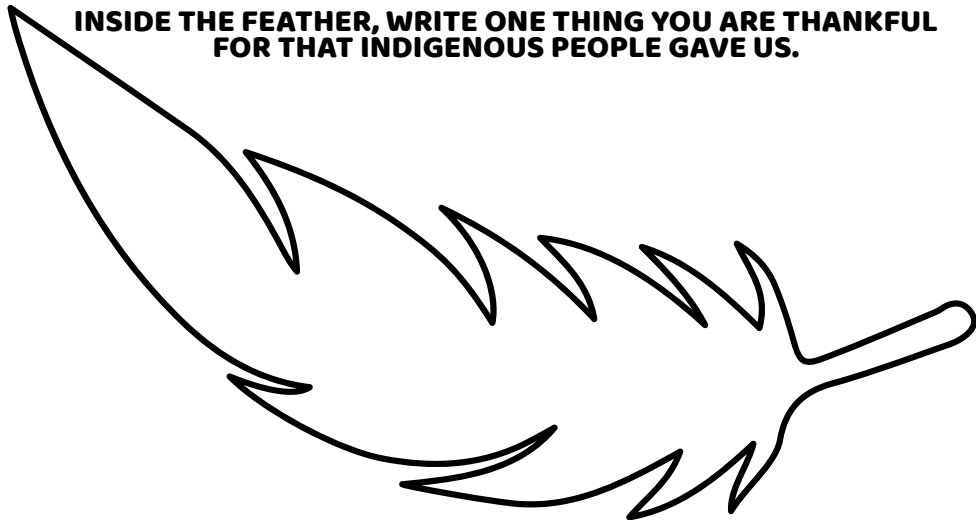

They learn songs, dances and stories.

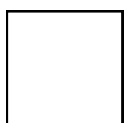
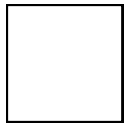
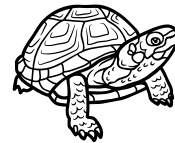
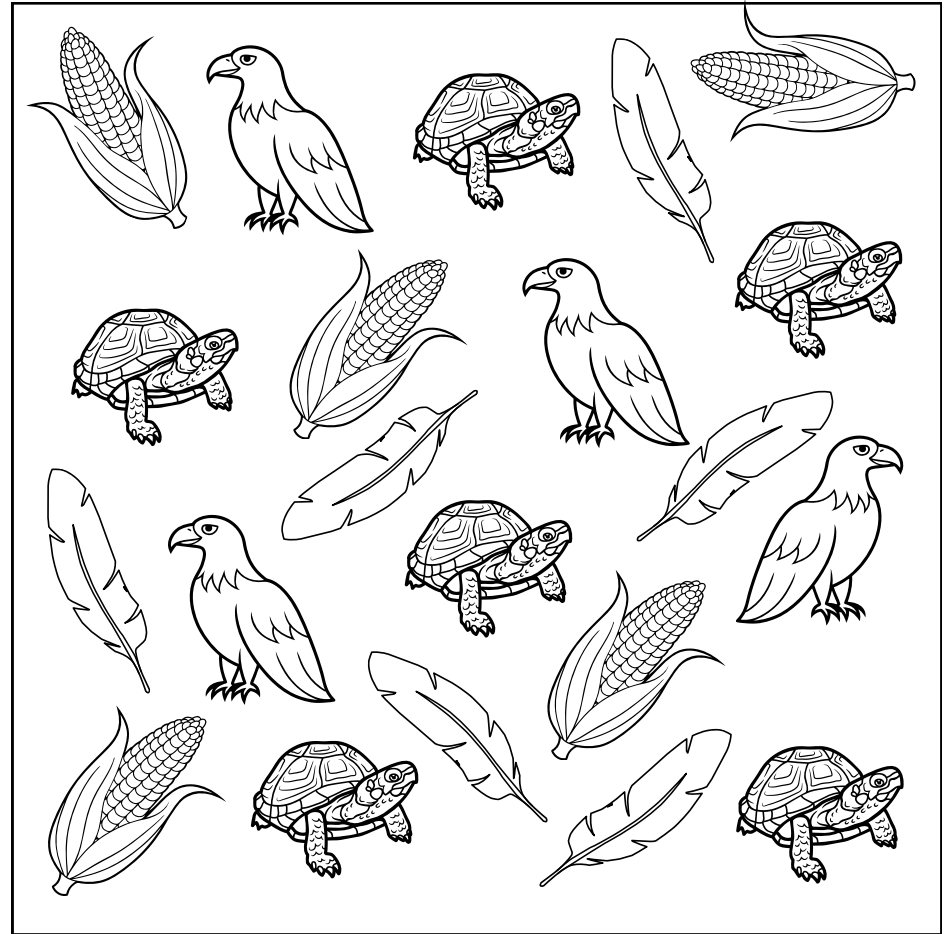
They help with farming, cooking, and caring for nature.

They are taught to respect traditions and keep them alive.

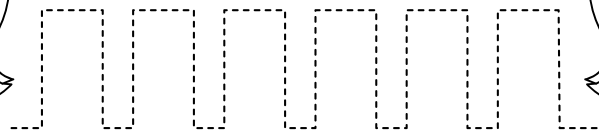
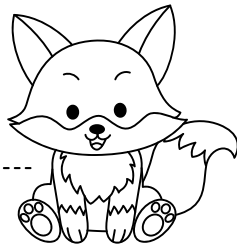
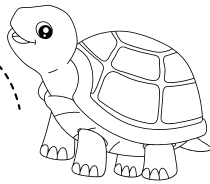
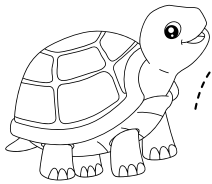
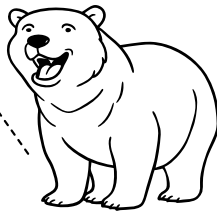
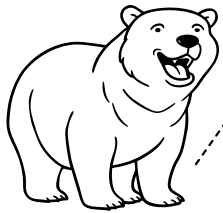
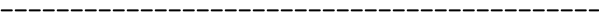
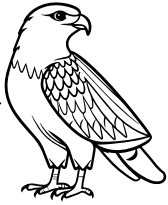
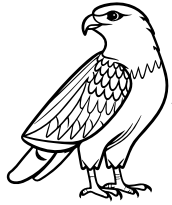
Learning from elders helps them remember their culture and share it with others.

LEARNING FROM INDIGENOUS PEOPLE



Some Indigenous People created tall wooden totem poles that told stories about families, traditions, and important animals. Each carving on the pole has a special meaning, like an eagle for strength or a bear for courage. Totem poles are like history books made of wood, teaching children about their culture and family.

MUSIC OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLE

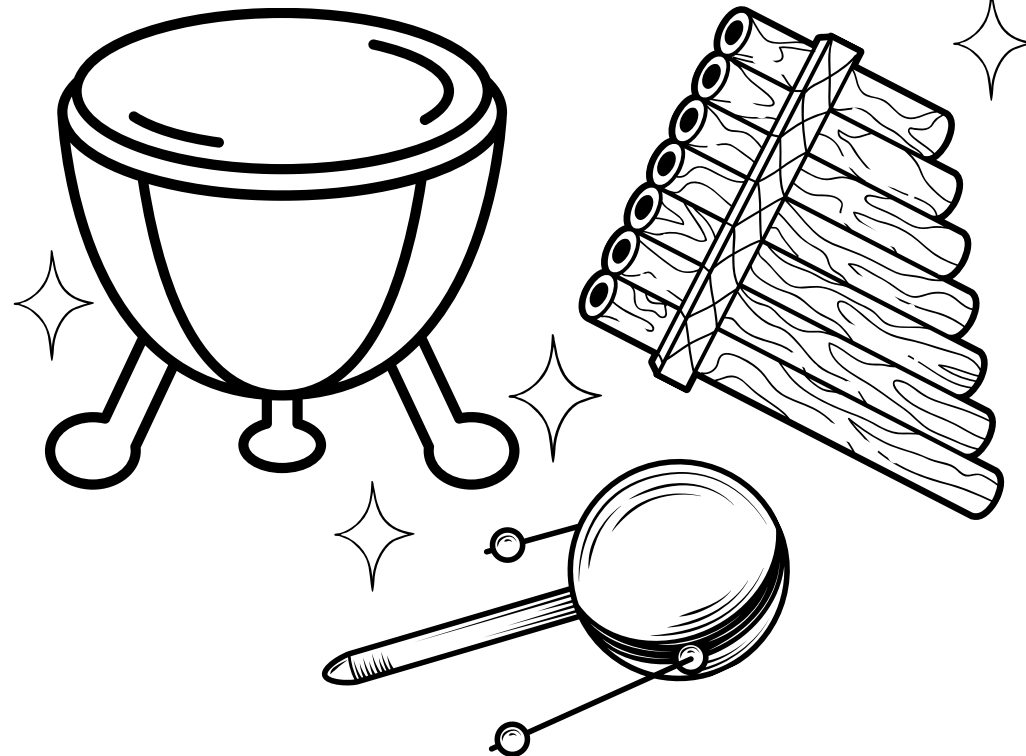
Indigenous People create beautiful music using drums, flutes, rattles, and songs. The steady beat of the drum is often called the “heartbeat of nature”, reminding people of life and the Earth. Flutes make soft, calming sounds, while rattles add rhythm to dances and ceremonies. Music is not just for fun it is used in celebrations, storytelling, and prayers, helping communities feel connected to each other and to nature.



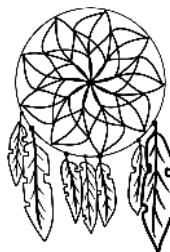
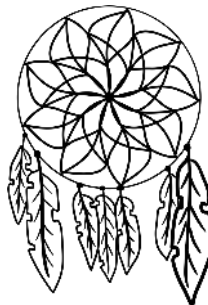
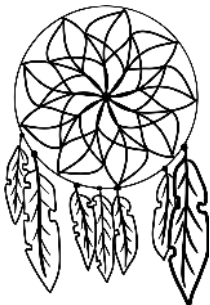
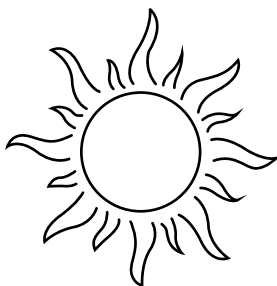
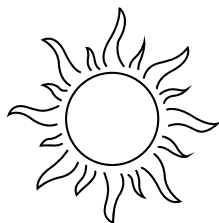
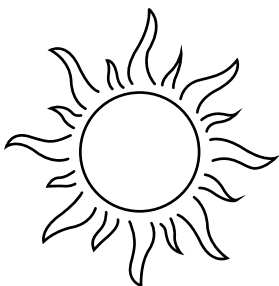

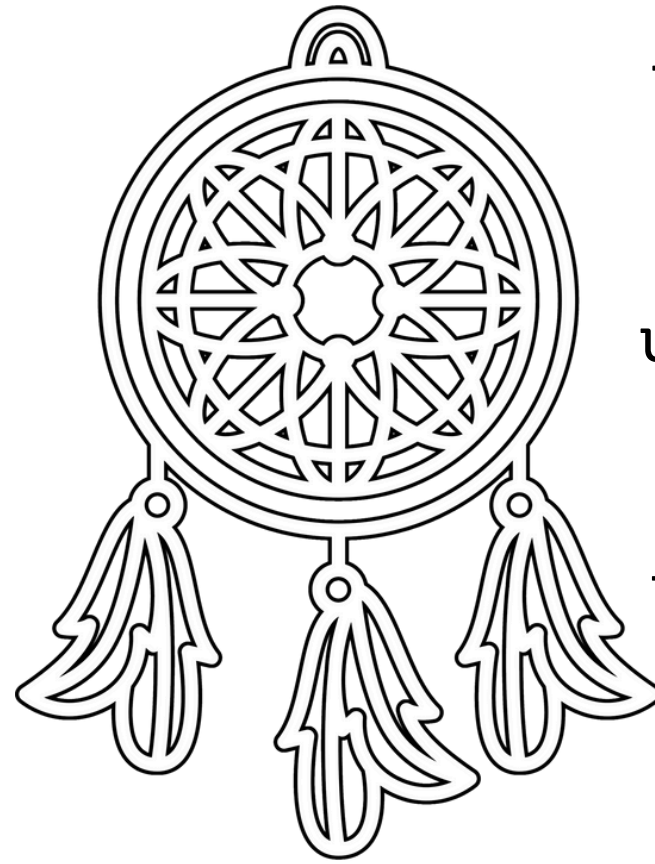


LIFESTYLE

HOMES – Different tribes had unique homes depending on their environment:

- Plains tribes
→ lived in tipis made of animal hides, easy to move when following buffalo.
- Southwest tribes (Hopi, Pueblo)
→ built adobe homes (mud and clay bricks).
- Eastern Woodlands tribes (Iroquois, Cherokee)
→ used longhouses or wigwams made of wood and bark.

Indigenous lifestyles and activities are shaped by the land, history, and culture—blending tradition with modern life while keeping their heritage alive.

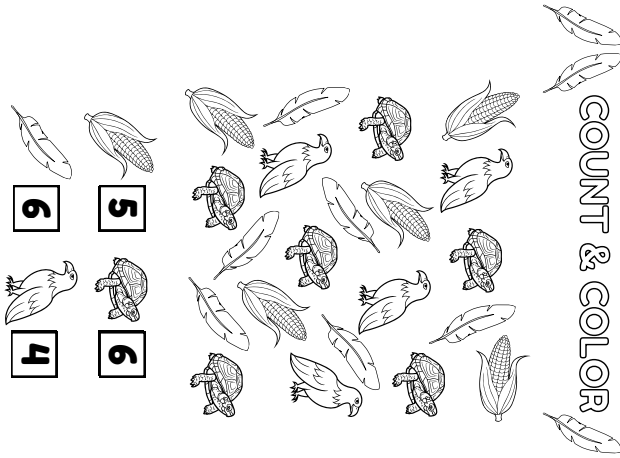

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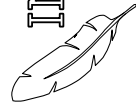
